The convention, held at the Cleveland Public Auditorium, also features the last public message to the Fellowship by Dr. Bob, who stresses, in his brief remarks, kindness and "keeping it simple."

Step Seven: An Adventure in Humility

My first adventure with Step Seven--getting on my knees in Trinity Church on Wall Street and earnestly reciting the Seventh Step Prayer--was an unassuming and useful exercise in willingness to follow AA suggestions and to seek divine help. But I was too embarrassed and angry at the ever-guilty-one (me) to note that my shortcomings remained unaffected and in healthy condition.

In the years since that church visit, I have noticed encouraging changes in many of my character flaws, but no neat pattern of change. My life-destroying obsession with vodka and other drinks was easily lifted at my first AA meeting, even before I was prepared to acknowledge to myself that it was a problem. I had readily acknowledged--and tried for years to break--my dependence on nicotine. On my first AA anniversary, I stopped smoking. It was easy, although I experienced emotional turmoil: sometimes I leaned toward murder, sometimes suicide, but never cigarettes. One neurotic symptom--procrastination, which had crippled me since childhood and which was so deeply embedded that I never thought it would be possible to lose--was lifted without any conscious request, humble or otherwise. On the rare occasions when defects have been lifted, their departures have generally been preceded by a horrendous bout of the problem; in this case, procrastinating on a task with a deadline. Since then, putting projects off has never been a serious problem.

On the other hand, my obsession with food, especially sweet stuff, which replaced my obsession with alcohol and nicotine, has been quite prayer-resistant.

I have noted that, each year that I continue trying to live by the guidelines set out in the Twelve Steps, my neurotic twitches and kinks seem to decrease and calmness and enjoyment seem to grow; my record with specific shortcomings, however, has been wildly erratic. I have concluded that, while God has power over the character defects that I cannot control, unfortunately I have no power over him.

That is my present view of the Seventh Step: I don't control my own deepest self; God does. What is more, I don't control God, though I sometimes have power to refuse God's help. He is an unpredictable mystery. Those are humbling realizations, but it is a relief to turn those aspects over to a Power More Competent than Myself.

Perpetual quietness of heart. It is to have no trouble. It is never to be fretted or vexed, irritable or sore; to wonder at nothing that is done to me, to feel nothing done against me.

It is to be at rest when nobody praises me, and when I am blamed or despised, to have a blessed home in myself where I can go in and shut the door and kneel to my Father in secret and be at peace, as in a deep sea of calmness, when all around and about is seeming trouble.
